We stand on grace, united by grace, the work is hard, and it will take courage; to dare to take risks, and to dare to make messes as we follow God into all kinds of new places. We will encounter all kinds of grace in new people and their stories; into the company of strangers on paths we would have never picked ourselves. We will do this because as people united by grace, we stand on grace.

We will do this because we are Easter people, people of hope and certainty of the future, because the risen Jesus Christ stands in the gaps of our lives, the gap that is God's grace and love, the gap that our world so desperately needs filled, as they encounter God through God's Easter people, **us**, yes, you and I in their lives!

Celebrating Maundy Thursday at Home

Adapted from a Service by Pastor Nancy Kraft

This celebration of Maundy Thursday can take place whether you live alone or with others. The optional foot washing is the only element where others would need to be present. If you do live alone, you may consider calling someone else who lives alone and readtogether, over the phone, portions of the service. Or, if you have the capacity, do a video chat through Zoom, FaceTime, or another platform, so you can even eat the meal "together"! Prepare a favorite meal and serve it using any special dishes, tableware, or tablecloths you may have available. Before you begin your meal, light a candle as a reminder that this isn't just any meal. Something special and holy is about to happen.

Read (aloud or to yourself): Did you know Jesus' last night with his friends was spent in a place called the Upper Room? That's where they gathered around a table for their meal. They thought it was going to be a meal just like so many other meals they had shared with Jesus, but this one turned out to be unlike any meal they had ever known. You may have seen pictures of the Last Supper where Jesus and the disciples are sitting in chairs, the way we do it. But, actually, they reclined on cushions at a table on the floor. It was a "laid back" occasion. There were two important things that happened at this meal. It was the first time Jesus took the bread and wine, blessed them, and said, "This is my body," and, "This is my blood." Every time we celebrate communion, we're remembering this night when Jesus shared himself with his disciples around the table. He's promised that he continues to come to us, even today, in the bread and wine. But before Jesus even got to the part where he gave his disciples Holy Communion for the first time, he did something to show them how much he loved them. He knelt before them and washed their feet. This was his way of showing them that, like him, they need to love and serve one another in humility. He gave them a new commandment, that they love one another as he loved them. In fact, the word "Maundy" means commandment.

Bible Reading: Read John 13:3-17, and 13:34-35.

Foot Washing (optional): If you have someone else living with you, pour some warm water in a basin, get out some towels and wash one another's feet. Even though this can be an embarrassing and ticklish experience for some, it is also a powerful act of servanthood, particularly when children wash their parents' feet. Remember to wash your hands afterward!

Table Grace: Before you eat, say this prayer: Lord, Jesus, on this holy night you washed the feet of your friends, and you shared your last meal with them. Bless this meal that we share tonight. Help us to remember that whenever we eat, you are here at the table with us, teaching us to love one another the way you have loved us. Amen.

Enjoy Your Meal! As you eat, think about some of the special meals that you have shared with the people you love. If you are with others or are on the phone or a video chat, share your answers to the following questions:

What made these special meals memorable?

How is this like or different than Holy Communion?

What do you miss about taking Holy Communion at Gloria Dei?

Read After Your Meal: When we come together to worship in our church building on Maundy Thursday, we end our time together with the stripping of the altar. As we hear a Psalm being read, all the objects on and around the altar are removed: candles, banners, altar book, communion ware, and table linens. When it is finished, the altar is completely bare. The stripping of the altar symbolizes the abandonment of Jesus by his disciples and the stripping of Jesus by the soldiers before his crucifixion. It reminds us of the barrenness of life without the hope of Christ that we have through his resurrection.

To remember this tradition, read Psalm 22 from your Bible (vv. 1-5 is sufficient but for the whole experience, read the entire Psalm!) You can do a "stripping of the altar" in your own home, using one or more of these activities:

Gather any faith related items you may have in your house – crosses, statues, religious art and symbols that can be easily removed. Pack them away somewhere, in a storage bin or a bag. Cover any large items with a cloth.

Remove all items from your dining table so it's completely empty and thoroughly wash it so it is both cleared and cleaned. Leave your table bare until Easter morning. Parents: on Saturday night when everyone has gone to bed, unpack and uncover the

religious items and decorate your dining room table with Easter joy so your family can awaken to a day of celebration!

From the Spirit, April 2021

There is a cave in Kentucky called Mammoth Cave. When you first enter, it appears quite empty of life. Dark, quiet, dank, barren.

And yet ... and yet ...

Like many caves, first impressions can be deceiving. You see, over 200 animals live in

Mammoth Cave. Animals that range from raccoons and other small creatures who accidentally venture into the cave and cannot figure out how to return to the outside, to animals who deliberately live both inside and outside of the cave, to fortytwo species of troglobites - animals adapted exclusively to life in the darkness. *Amid seeming emptiness, life is abundant.*

If one were to drive by most of our church buildings, parking lots would be empty and the doors would be locked. A casual observer might say, "That church is empty. Nothing is happening there."

And yet ... and yet ...

First impressions can be deceiving. There is a lot of life happening in congregations and ministry sites. There are people who have joined communities of faith in our synod that, for various reasons, would never have entered the doors of a church building. They have become part of the community through online worship – even if they live thousands of miles away. There are people who were a part of the church community for years – but because of work schedules or health issues or mobility concerns – they had faded away. Now they are coming each week as they re-connect. And there are people who have never left. They continue to foster relationships, enjoy serving in the community of the church, and who are faithful to the tasks that are required to keep churches functioning.

We have groups in many churches that are working with other organizations to help feed, clothe, teach, and be with people in the neighborhoods. We have those who are having sometimes uncomfortable (but always fruitful) conversations about what it means to be faithful in this time and place. We have many who are visiting and calling the sick and the dispirited.

Fundamentally, together we are living into the good news of Jesus and journeying together in the Spirit as we are Church in the world. *Amid seeming emptiness, life is abundant.*

Listen to these words from the first Easter, "Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him!' (John 20:1-2)

Mary looked into that tomb and saw only lifelessness and she despaired. She peered into the shadows and felt, deep in her bones, the darkness of sorrow, abandonment, disappointment, grief, heartache, and pain. She had gone searching for something, someone, and she came away with nothing.

And yet ... and yet ...

Jesus had risen. Jesus, scars and all, was going to meet her in the garden. In a few hours Jesus would call Mary's name and assure her of his love. Jesus would come to the disciples and breathe on them – giving them peace and asking them to, "Feed

his sheep." And they would. *Amid seeming emptiness, life is abundant.*

Dear Beloveds, this last year has felt somewhat like we were living in a cave. We have been confined, somewhat lost, weary, and wondering where the new life is. We have stumbled on rocks and fallen in despair.

And yet ... and yet ...

We trust that soon we will be gathering in-person together. Soon we will be beyond this pandemic. Soon life will not "return to normal" but instead will move forward as we live God's calling of loving God and loving neighbor.

We know this because we are a resurrection people. Out of death comes life. We place our trust in our risen Savior who died and is raised again. *Amid seeming emptiness, life is abundant in Christ Jesus our risen Savior*.

And we all proclaim: Alleluia! Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed!

Where does love live, if not in our hearts and in our relationships with God and our neighbors?

My heart is heavy with this week's news of a young white man's racial hatred targeting Asian and Asian American women for murder in Atlanta. Is there no limit to the depths of hatred and inhumanity?

What insanity blames innocent fellow citizens for a virus that spreads silently, putting people of every nation and race at risk? No-one is safe. No-one is to blame. If one suffers, we all suffer together.

My heart overflows with love for the women who lost their lives, for elders attacked on sidewalks, for passers-by spit at. Love lives where people lay their lives down for their neighbors, not where people violate the dignity, safety and very lives of their neighbors out of irrational fear and hatred.

Listen with me to the reflections of my friend and colleague, Bishop Bob Hoshibata of the Desert Southwest Conference, who said this week: "We must confront the ways that harm presents itself: whether it be 'innocent' re-telling of jokes, to perpetuating racist rhetoric related to COVID-19, or violent actions to innocent people, we must acknowledge that these are things that fuel bias and prejudice against those of Asian heritage."

<u>I affirm the words from</u> Asian and Asian American Bishops of the United Methodist Church, the New Federation of Asian American United Methodists, the Asian American Language Ministry Plan, along with other Asian American leaders and academics of the United Methodist Church, including some from the Greater NW Area: "We ask that all United Methodists read again and live out our own Charter for Racial Justice which states that all persons are of equal value in the sight of

God and that racism is a rejection of the teachings of Jesus Christ."



around us. It can be challenging at its best. It can be easy to dismiss our calling. It can be easy to turn our backs on others. We can justify our apathy by giving our time to our families and nothing more.

But God calls us to do more. He calls us to serve "the least of these". I've read Matthew 25:34-40 many times and often feel convicted but I don't think these verses are just a laundry list of service opportunities. This time, as I read them, I focused less about WHAT I should do and instead looked at WHY I should do it. Matthew 25:40 "Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me."

Serving Christ by serving others. Serving because we aren't just serving our neighbors who are hungry, we are serving God. If we really saw God in our service, would it change our perspective? If Jesus was standing on a street corner, hungry, would we walk on by? If Jesus was locked in a prison cell, would we pretend He didn't exist? If Jesus was sick with COVID or even just at risk, would we complain about our "rights"? Our brothers and sisters suffering in unimaginable ways. Living in fear in the midst of war and crime. Children locked in cages at the border because their parents wanted, needed, a better life for them. Our elderly dying alone, separated from their loved ones. If we saw them as JESUS, would that change our heart?

Finding time to serve is challenging but God tells us how to do it. Open our eyes around us and see JESUS standing in front of us, needing our help. If we focus on "the least of these", our time will be well spent.

34 "Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. 35 For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, 36 I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.'

Hi Friends -

April is here and lent is almost over, and your generosity and faithfulness to the church and it needs continues keep us going! We continue to meet our financial needs, even though there are fluctuations each month - it all seems to even out!

The MUMC finance committee has met (Mike O, Tanya and myself) and hammered out a budget for the 2021 year (better late than never, right?) that will be presented to the council for approval this month. Once approved, those figures will be available to anyone who would like to see them, so let me know if you would like to see it.

We got notice from the Conference that our apportionments have gone down from \$13,193 for 2020 to \$10,734 for 2021- a savings just over \$200/ mo.!! Every little bit helps. We are also doing an analysis of the utilities over the past year and Tanya has done a great job of changing a few things to save us money each month (like getting smaller dumpsters and going off the budget plan for utilities.) We watch these amounts and look for spikes that could mean broken water pipes or meter problems, since no one is in the church and seldom in the annex, and the amount should be fairly consistent .

May you all stay healthy and save and enjoy the spring that has sprung, with Gods help and guidance.
