


There will not be a service offered on Christmas Day. We encourage you to watch the Christmas Eve service which will be rebroadcast all day Christmas.





From the Spirit, December 2022

From the ELCA Bishop:

I took the quilt to the cleaners to get washed. They looked at it and handed it back. If we touch this, they said, it will fall apart.

To most eyes, the quilt is nothing to look at. The bright yellow ducklings have long faded to muted colors. The binding is frayed. Happy, my dog from

childhood, chewed holes in the fabric where stuffing came out and repair was never finished. (Happy did this to many sheets and blankets in my growing up years. My sisters and I called them "Happy holes." My mom did not.)

From the time I was a toddler, this quilt has held my <u>laughter</u>, <u>tears</u>, <u>secrets</u>, <u>sleep</u>, <u>insomnia</u>, <u>sickness</u>, <u>health</u>, <u>anger</u>. <u>In darkness</u>, <u>this quilt surrounded me in warmth</u>. Years later, my children were wrapped in this same quilt.

Long before my grandma quilted my "duckie" blanket and gave it to me, there was a young family without permanent shelter and a baby soon to be born. The village midwives came into the night to help birth a baby for a family unknown. They came to an unhoused couple, a foreign couple, a poor couple with no prospects or power. And yet, these midwives left their warm houses and their own families, bringing their own handmade blankets and strips of cloth as they participated in this baby's birth. And, when he was born, they wrapped this child and his mom in warmth.

We know this because we hear the angels' words to the shepherds, "This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger.' Surely if the baby was wrapped in bands of cloth, the child was also wrapped in blankets.

What a difference it would have been without these blankets, without these swaddling cloths, without these midwives. Without the skills and the gifts God gave to them. The vocation of midwife brought Jesus into the world. The hands and wisdom of these women wrapped him in swaddling cloths.

It is such an amazing story ... through God's invitation, and from Mary saying yes and Joseph saying yes and the innkeeper saying yes and the midwives saying yes – Jesus came.

Two thousand years ago, in a way no one could have imagined, God was with us in human form. Wrapped in blankets. Held in love.

What love, what grace, what beauty. Amazingly and almost inconceivably, in this little baby, God's love came and God's love continues to be among us through Jesus – Immanuel, Incarnate, God-in-the-flesh love. Embodied love ... for you and for me. Always.

I know that life is messy. Life is sometimes hard. Sometimes the world seems out of control and we are so small against so much of what is out there. And yet ... through something as small and vulnerable as a newborn baby, we are promised that God is here. Amongst us. And God's love is for everyone. Absolutely everyone. Regardless of your job or your political party, your anxiety or your income. Your ethnicity, your language, your gender, your situation in life. God's love is for you who celebrate this holy day and God's love is for those who don't. God's love is for those you are estranged from and those you embrace.

This Christmas and this year, may you feel surrounded by God's love and presence. In your laughter, tears, secrets, sleep, insomnia, sickness, health, anger - in darkness and in light may you feel God wrapping you into God's embrace ... like a worn, faded blanket that is covered in ducks and Happy holes.

Beyond Weapons of War

Let all that you do be done in love.

I Corinthians 16:14

November 22, 2022

Friends in Christ, Thanksgiving is Thursday and Advent starts next Sunday.

My heart is anguished after the murders at Club Q in Colorado Springs last weekend. In "barely a minute," five people died, 17 others were shot, and two others were injured. The 22-year-old shooter, carrying an AR-15-style semi-automatic rifle, stalked his prey in a place people came for sanctuary from anti-LGBTQIA+ hatred. They were unarmed in an enclosed space, like sitting ducks or fish in a barrel.

No one has the right to hunt and kill innocent people. No civilian should have the right to carry an assault weapon designed for war.

If you are a person who identifies as LGBTQIA+, I see you, *I love you*, *I need you to survive*. You should not be targeted for ridicule, bullying, or bodily harm by people who don't understand you or hate you. I believe that Jesus calls every Christian to be a trustworthy ally as you seek to live the fullness of life God sets before you, but many are slow to respond to this call.

If you are a person who hates or fears LGBTQIA+ people, I'm sorry for you; you don't have to remain where you are today. Each of us is held to account for our fear, our hatred, and our inaction. In the gospels, we have a front-row seat as Jesus meets all kinds of misunderstood and marginalized people – leper, blind, possessed, lame, tax collectors, women caught in adultery or with a flow of blood, robbers. He seeks them out, speaks with them, and invites them into his circle of friends. He saved his disdain for high priests and pious people he thought should know better – like us.

If you follow Jesus, he will introduce you to LGBTQIA+ people, and you will be given the opportunity to grow in your knowledge and love of Jesus by seeing what Jesus sees in them. We must love our way out of hate, or we will find ourselves on the side of Herod, slaughtering innocents in the pursuit of his rival, Jesus, instead of on the side of humble shepherds, tending their flocks and welcoming his arrival.

Regardless of political party, it is time for Christian people, striving to walk in the way of Jesus, to join with others of generous spirit, to rise up to stop the sale of assault weapons. Courageous citizens have the power to protect innocent victims from people who lack the intellectual, moral, emotional, or spiritual ability to resist an impulse to wholesale slaughter. It is blasphemous to pray for God to do what we have the power but not yet the will to do. We are our brother's/sister's/sibling's keeper. We can act, and so we must, to save countless lives.

This Thanksgiving, I hope you will enjoy good food in the company of people you love, whether family, friends, or strangers. I hope you will pray for those on both ends of gun violence. And as we prepare for the birth of Jesus, learn more and work to ban private ownership of weapons designed for war. I urge you to see how our General Board of Church and Society is helping us get involved in resisting gun violence. I hope you will also consider writing a letter to your elected representatives, as Olympia First UMC encouraged us at our annual conference session in June. We can make it safer for innocent, vulnerable people to gather without fear for work, a concert, a drag show, a movie, a nightclub, school, church, for love.

Love is born at Christmas!

December MUMC Overview

Monroe United Methodist Church held its All Church Conference on November 21st. District Superintendent Mark Galang oversaw the meeting. I was struck by his statement: "I hope we're ready for the change God is proposing!" He shared the election of the most diverse slate of Bishops ever elected. Thirteen new Bishops were elected, three in the Western Jurisdiction:

- 8 were BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color)
- 7 were women
- The first Native American Bishop in the US was elected.
- The first Filipino American Bishop in the US and the first Bishop to be ordained outside of the US was elected.
- The first Hispanic in the North East Jurisdiction was elected.
- The first Black woman in the South Central Jurisdiction was elected.

And our Greater Northwest Episcopal Area elected Bishop Cedric Bridgeforth, the first Black and openly gay Bishop. He is joined by his husband, Christopher.

Retiring Bishop Elaine JW Stanovsky also made a wonderful video message in which she shared her desire for us to unite in love rather than continue the divisions that permeate our society and the church. She gave a reminder that it is a New Day we are all entering into with the church and with each other.

MUMC unanimously voted to merge with Morning Star Lutheran Church!

DS Mark Galang closed with a recitation of the poem "Continue" by Maya Angelou: "Continue To dare to love deeply And risk everything For the good thing"

While we are still waiting for permits for the new sign, we move forward to serve our community as United in Grace.


