

### Greetings in Christ!

This morning, as I do most Tuesday mornings, Kathi and I get together in the church office to review last Sunday's service, Dorothy Garrison's Celebration of Life last Saturday, this week's service, worship and event planning for the fall, and begin to think about Advent and Christmas. It was a busy morning and in the midst of that conversation we both lamented that we were sad that summer was coming to an end. The night had brought us enough rain to measure, which we have had very little of this Summer. As I am writing today is quite cool and overcast after we have had an unusually warm and dry summer and the air is at least clean for now after days of thick smoke and haze from wildfires in our state.

Kathi (Kathi Cooley is the Church Administrator for both congregations), and I are just not ready to say goodbye to summer yet. We, perhaps like you are wondering what the Fall and Winter seasons will have in store for us in Western Washington. As I sit at home to write I have opened the windows so that I can hear the rain drops land on the fir branches and maple leaves. It is both music to my ears as God's creation is getting much needed watering and a reminder that Autumn will be upon us soon even though it seems that summer only just began yesterday!

Autumn is, above all else, a time of change. It is also a time of new beginnings. In addition to the changing weather, the hours of daylight shorten, curtailing or eliminating our evening outdoor activities. It is not as dramatic for us here in the Pacific Northwest, yet we still experience the changes in nature from our un-watered brownish lawns turning plush green again with the fall rains, to the changing leaves giving us glimpses of the brilliant colors of autumn. We are called to hear the deepest thoughts, needs and desires of others and then to speak and act out the proclamation of the living word of God made Flesh in Jesus the Christ. Right Here! Right Now! This often messy and disturbing word of God made flesh in Jesus the Christ calls us to listen, to hear and to see. Jesus calls us to be and do love abundantly, and we act because of the abundant love and grace we have been given by God through Jesus the Christ

Let us ponder the hospitality of grace where all are welcome and the gifts of the other who come into our lives is both wanted and needed. as they come to us because we are incomplete without them. They might even bring God to us in new and interesting ways if we can keep our hearts, eyes and ears open.

I would like to invite us as a congregation and us individually to practice God's hospitality and grace filled welcome to all. For the months ahead as we move toward Advent and Christmas, I would like to encourage you to invite your neighbors into your home. Consider standing on your front porch or steps or on in your front yard and wonder who might come, and then welcome them in, especially if you don't know them! Remember what it is like when you feel like an outsider and let that help you to invite. Maybe even invite those into your home who attend church whom you don't know well or not at all.

Might we also stand on the front steps of the church and prayerfully wonder who of God's beloved children might need for someone to listen to their hearts and needs, and to hear, experience God's mercy, love and grace.




May you continue to seek, find, and receive God's hope, love and grace this autumn in surprising ways and in unexpected gatherings in your homes!



## Hazel's Little Free Pantry Financial Report

Hazel's Little Free Pantry was born during the pandemic to help those not easily able to meet everyday food and personal needs. It has grown to so much more since then, and the Pantry Team thought you'd like to know how your donations are spent and how far they go.

#### January 1 through July 31:

<ul> <li>Contribution Revenues:</li> </ul>	\$2,043
<ul> <li>Operating Expenses (food)</li> </ul>	\$1,910
Hold over for next month:	\$ 133

- The team buys canned soups, tuna, and other proteins, ramen noodles, oatmeal, breakfast and protein bars, snack food, juice, peanut butter, fruit cups, Vienna sausage, and milk.
- We are fortunate to now have regular donations of milk, peanut butter, and oatmeal.
- For the time being, we have someone that has been donating cereal and crackers, but we don't know how long she will be able to continue.
- We rely solely on donations for feminine hygiene products, soaps, shampoos, etc.

It costs approximately \$330 per month, or \$10.75 per day to fill the pantry. (This is taking into account the food and other items that are donated). This number goes up significantly in the winter when more canned food (protein) is needed.

Your \$20 donation fills the pantry for 2 days; \$50 would fill the pantry for almost 5 days.

Thank you for faithfully and cheerfully giving to help Hazel's Little Free Pantry continue.

### Putting God in the Center

I'm really enjoying my training courses to become a Certified Lay Minister. I love to learn and combining my love of learning with my love of God is fantastic. The courses are all done online with students from all over the country, so we get some interesting discussions going. Not all of us agree on what's being taught and it's interesting to get to think about what God is trying to tell us and not just what the instructors think.

One discussion that I found particularly meaningful was in my "Planning and Leading Worship" class. The discussion centered around the idea that worship is our way of celebrating God, not what we get out of it. Frequently, we pick apart the service, "I didn't care for those hymns", "The sermon didn't speak to me", "The slides got messed up", "The reader stumbled over the words". We miss the whole point of the service: to glorify God.



I will confess, I can be guilty of all of those comments. The class challenged my assumptions teaching me to look at the service not as a collection of parts but as a way to truly worship our Creator God in church and not just while walking outside in nature. To spend more time reflecting on the words of the hymns, asking God to reveal His message to me in the sermon, understanding that mistakes happen in the service because only God is perfect, and reflecting on the scripture being read not the person reading it.

The class also challenged my approach to the service when I'm a part of it. I was shown how to really study and pray over the scripture when I'm asked to lead. To approach each role as a gift to God instead of just how I do it or what I get out of it. So, now I'm challenging you. The next time you're in worship, turn your eyes to our Forgiving God. Relish the opportunity to give back to God in thanks for all that He's done for you. Soften your heart to the humanness of others. Let the service wash over you, letting God speak to you in it but also give of yourself in praise to the triune God we serve.

### From the **Bishop:**

I went to the musical 1776 a few nights ago where I learned some new things about how the Declaration of Independence came to be written. As I watched, I felt proud to be an American – to be part of a group of people who wanted freedom from tyranny, freedom to vote, freedom from an empire far away.

There were also moments in this play when I was horrified at some decisions made. At the last minute, the clause to abolish slavery was removed so that all of the representatives would sign the document. The most powerful song in the musical, *Molasses to Rum*, reminds the audience how all the colonies were complicit in the selling of hu-

mans – not just the south. (<a href="https://genius.com/John-cullum-molasses-to-rum-lyrics">https://genius.com/John-cullum-molasses-to-rum-lyrics</a>)

As an American, I hold two realities. First, I rejoice in the wonder and aspiration of the United States of America. I am grateful for this country and I love what it is striving to be. At its best, it is a country where freedom and liberty are supreme. It is a place where care is given to those arriving on its shores. It is a place where people can freely go to church and other places of worship (or not go at all). In short, the United States is a promise of what can be.

At the same time, I hold the truth of this country's sins. Enslaved men built the White House, the U.S. Capitol building, and others. Homes of former presidents including George Washington's Mount Vernon and James Madison's Montpelier were built by men "owned" by them. The land that we in the Northwest Washington Synod are living on was once land that belonged to Samish and Duwamish, Lummi, and Muckleshoot and many others. Japanese people were unjustly imprisoned during World War II. Sundown laws and redlining laws were written throughout this country. As a white woman, I know that I could not vote until 1919. For women of color, the right to vote did not come until later. People who are part of the LGBTQIA+ communities have been harassed and discriminated against, beaten up and killed in this country. And discriminatory practices and violence continue to this day. In short, the systems in this country have violated and harmed people since its inception.

This is what it means to be an American: to vote, to engage in civic society, to appreciate this country, to grieve past and present sins, and to truthfully stand up and speak when it falls short of its ideals.

But what about those of us who are American and also Christian? Unequivocally it means that as much as one might love this country, this is not where our ultimate allegiance lies. For we are part of the body of Christ that extends beyond the borders of any country. As Lutheran Christians, we know that we are named, chosen, and called by God through Jesus. We hold deeply the joy that we are freed from sin, and, because of this, we are called into radical love, acceptance, and welcome – far beyond being a citizen of any country. We are freed to live beyond racism, injustice, and bigotry. Martin Luther wrote that freedom is a gift from God, not just for our sake, or our country's sake, but for the sake of the world.

Tragically, there are those who want to distort this freedom. To somehow merge Christian and American identities. Rather than freedom, conflating religious authority with political authority leads to tyranny and marginalization - especially of minority groups. Christian Nationalism is neither patriotic nor is it faithful. You do not have to be Christian to be a "true" American. And you do not have to be American to be Christian. At its heart, it is idolatrous. As the First Commandment states, "You shall have no other gods."

Together, as faithful Christians, let us live into Jesus' words –into radical love, acceptance and welcome. Let us speak truth to power and stand with those without power. Let us follow Jesus who commands us to love everyone as our brothers and sisters and siblings including our fellow citizens, those of other belief systems, and those of other nations. Together, as faithful Christians, let us stand up and speak out against Christian Nationalism and any system that marginalizes, harms, and subjugates another. As Jesus announces in the gospel of Luke, 'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because God has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. God has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor.'

For freedom Christ has set us free. May we live and dance and revel in the freedom of Christ.


May you recognize God's blessings in the little things you encounter each day and pass on His grace, given to you, to all you encounter.
