As our communities begin to open up, we begin to breathe a sigh of relief and hope that all will be back to normal once again. By listening to a prophetic voice among us we became a new creation of God Bearers, reminding each other and our community of this living presence of God's love, grace, peace and mercy.

My dear siblings, *Breathe Deep*! Breathe in the living breath of the living God who has been faithful through the years, continues to be faithful today, and will continue to be faithful tomorrow and forever. Trust and believe that God is leading and guiding us to be sign of love, hope, healing, mercy and grace. This is the mission of God and is our mission, our only mission. MSLC and MUMC are looking to return to in person worship services in the fall. However, this will not be the same as worship a year and a half ago. Under the current guidelines from the UMC Bishop Elaine Stanovsky, six-foot distancing and wearing of masks are required. Every person over two years of age is required to wear a mask indoors even if you have been vaccinated. If you do not have a reusable mask, we will provide a disposable mask.

Attendance will be capped at 15 households each Sunday, so you will be required to register each week with how many will be attending. You will need to arrive early as entrance will be one household at a time.

Our plan is to re-open **only** the upper floor for worship services on Sundays and reopen **only** the lower floor for church groups during the week. Cleaning and disinfecting will be based on this requirement.

On-line worshipping is here to stay. We will continue to have online services after reopening.

Unfortunately there will be no congregational singing. Clapping hands, snapping fingers, or hand gestures appropriate to the words are alternatives. We will have small groups of musicians -1-2 soloists with singers' masks or 1-2 instrumentalists with instrument players face masks and instrument covers.

The guidelines may change between now and September. IF the guidelines are relaxed, we will relax our reopening procedures.

Reopening the Church Survey Results

There were 32 responses to the Reopening the Church Survey.

All 32 respondents and 27 spouses and 2 children were vaccinated. This is good news! If the 32 households who responded to our survey were the only persons who might attend our church, we would be very safe. But we want to be a congregation which welcomes visitors -- vacationers, newcomers to

Monroe, persons grateful for the Little Pantry, etc. So we can't assume that everyone who comes to worship will be vaccinated.

On the open ended question, thirteen households would like the church to reopen now or as soon as possible. Two of these explicitly rejected wearing masks and social distancing. Another eleven would be ready to come back when everyone is vaccinated. Five mentioned they would be ready if safety precautions were taken, such as wearing masks and social distancing. Three would come back when "all is as it was," when we can sing and pass the peace and share coffee again.

Similarly 13 felt it was very urgent to return to an in-church building service. Ten felt it was not at all urgent and nine felt it was not at all urgent with 10 in the middle.

Only one household responded that they would always attend on line, but three said they would mostly attend on line and eight said they would sometimes attend on line. So continuing on-line services after we reopen is necessary. Thirteen households would mostly attend in person and eight would always attend in person.

With six foot distancing, only fifteen households can attend on a given Sunday. This means there will likely be more households wanting to attend on any Sunday than can be accommodated. So a reservation system will be needed.

Respondents broke evenly on the question of participating and helping support both an on-line and in-person worship service with fourteen responding definitely or possibly yes and fourteen responding don't know, possibly no or definitely no. Hopefully this will provide sufficient participation and support to provide both on-line and in-person worship in the fall.

Growing in Grace July 2021



From the Spirit, July 2021

For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery. Galatians 5:1

What does freedom mean to you? In this month that we in the United States celebrate Independence Day with fireworks and barbe-

cues (yay for vaccines – we can have barbecues again!), what is freedom?

Well ... first let's consider what freedom is NOT. Freedom is NOT enormous sums of money, power, privilege, assets, stocks and bonds, cars, clothes, or degrees. Freedom is NOT being able to do anything you want without worrying how your actions might affect another. Freedom is NOT hedonism or casual cruelty. Freedom is NOT the ability to yell at someone either in person or online. Freedom is NOT to be taken lightly.

Unfortunately, we have conflated freedom with selfishness. We have decided freedom means we don't have to worry about our behavior or words. We have decided that we no longer need to be civil or caring or understanding of another's viewpoint or worldview or interest. In this synod, I am concerned at the rancor I am hearing, the level of uncivil discourse, and the inability to listen to people from different sides of different issues.

So ... what IS freedom?

Martin Luther writes in The Freedom of a Christian that through Christ, we are set free from sin into new life. He writes:

From faith flow forth love and joy in the Lord, and from love a cheerful, willing, free spirit, disposed to serve our neighbor voluntarily, without taking any account of gratitude or ingratitude, praise or blame, gain or loss. Its object is not to lay [others] under obligations, nor does it distinguish between friends and enemies, or look to gratitude or ingratitude but most freely and willingly spends itself and its goods, whether it loses them through ingratitude, or gains good will.

Freedom described in this way sounds amazing. But we know that it isn't that simple. We all know that even as baptized children of God, even as people assured that we are saved through Jesus Christ, even as people who revel in freedom — we know that we are not always cheerful and willing, disposed to serve our neighbor voluntarily. We know that the freedom we have been given through Jesus is sometimes squandered because of greed, racism, homophobia, sexism, nationalism, individualism, pride, and so much more. Quite simply, sin. We think that we are free and yet we are choosing death over abundant life.

And yet ... what a gift we have been given! For when we live fully into our baptisms, we are called into community with God and with one another. We are called into caring for one another. We are called to listen, love, and serve others – even those we might not particularly like. God calls us away from selfish behavior and into freedom to commit ourselves fully to each other. As Paul writes in Galatians 6:2: "Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ." As

baptized children of God and as the body of Christ in this world, we are called to the freedom of Christ. And this means we are called to a life not only for ourselves, but to die to ourselves and live truly in the freedom of bearing one another's burdens.

As a proud American, I love the Fourth of July. As a person following Jesus, I know that freedom means more than waving a flag or wearing the colors of red, white, and blue. As Martin

Luther writes in his treatise On Christian Freedom,

"A Christian is the most free lord of all, and subject to none; a Christian is the most dutiful servant of all, and subject to everyone."

May freedom in Christ reign. May the love of Christ be with you and all that you encounter.

From the Bishop: Join me in honoring Juneteenth National Independence Day People of God,

"If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free."

John 8: 31-32

June 19, known as Juneteenth, celebrates the freedom of enslaved Black Americans, by recalling the day in 1865 when the news of President Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation was finally proclaimed in Texas, three years after it was issued.

Yesterday the U.S. Congress established June 19th as a federal holiday: Juneteenth National Independence Day. The action awaits President Biden's signature.

On Saturday, June 19th at 10 a.m., the Coos Bay Museum in Coos Bay, Oregon, will dedicate a memorial to the only confirmed lynching of a Black man in the state of Oregon. Alonzo Tucker was lynched in Coos Bay in 1902 as a crowd of 300 people watched. Sponsors of Saturday's memorial event hope at least 300 people will attend the online dedication of a memorial to Alonzo Tucker.

The memorial to Alonzo Tucker's lynching is part of a movement of the National Memorial of Peace and Justice to remember and mark the sites where more than 4,400 Black people died by lynching between 1877 and 1950. Taylor Stewart began the Oregon Remembrance Project after visiting the National Memorial as part of a Civil Rights tour of southern states.

Much of our nation's violent racial history has been forgotten or suppressed by white Americans or assumed to have occurred only in slave states. This event, on Juneteenth, 2021, is an opportunity for citizens of the Northwest to remember and realize that this region has its own violent past that is ours to reckon with and heal.

I hope you will join me online on Saturday, Juneteenth, 2021, as part of the crowd that stands for truth, justice and reconciliation.

If anyone speaks, they should do so as one who speaks the very words of God. If anyone serves, they should do so with the strength God provides, so that in all things God may be praised through Jesus Christ. To him be the glory and the power for ever and ever. Amen."
