It is with hope and a deep longing to connect with family and friends that I, along with all of you, pray that soon we will have enough of our church family and our communities vaccinated that we may gather and enjoy the summer with a renewed sense of wonder. Remember that every vaccine gets us one step closer to being connected.



I remember as a child how wonder filled and extraordinary summer always was. If you have lost some of this wonder yourself, I invite you in these next months to take a child into the wonders of God's creation. Watch them play and live in God's grace and his unfailing faithfulness that surrounds you from the warmth of the summer sun on your face to the squeals of a summer parade.

The season after Pentecost is the longest season of the church year is often called ordinary time and yet in Mark's Gospel, we will hear great, not so ordinary, but extraordinary, stories of Jesus. We will hear stories that will remind us of the relationship of Jesus' life in our lives today, life on life, living daily as baptized, forgiven, blessed, gifted, and named as beloved children by God.

We will be challenged through the scriptures to become good neighbors and be a blessing to them. No, not so ordinary time indeed!

I invite you this summer to have some "Abiding time" and/or "Sabbath rest" with God, and with family and friends. Find time to intentionally rest and abide with God, listening to the voice of God comforting you and giving you rest and peace. This could be as part of vacation time that is used in part for rest and renewal or a part of each week. Listen for God's voice in the thin silences of your days; see God's abundance and beauty in all that is around you. Know that God is in all of creation and in all of the people who intersect with you this summer from the grocery clerk to those who serve us coffee or food or ice cream, to the child playing in the park, from families taking a walk together, to the person on the street whom you struggle to look directly into their eyes.

I invite you to smile a lot this summer and as we are able, to celebrate the gift of time with our family, friends, and the loves of our lives as we strengthen and go deeper into our relationships. Have fun; share meals together, enjoy the sun when we have it and laugh, laugh a lot with others. Hold each other in the stuff of life that gets us down and hold each other as the sun sets each day, because tomorrow the sun will rise, and the promise of a new day and new life have been given to us by God through the continued resurrection of Jesus the Christ. Know that all of this is of God and God is waiting and longing for time with you. The gift of time and presence you spend with your loved ones are seeds that will last a lifetime and will change your life and the lives of those you touch. The seeds will grow, and beauty of the blooms of love and grace will be abundant and leave a permanent mark long after we are gone.

I leave you with these words by Seattle playwright Stephen Dietz:

"What do we affect during our lifetime? What ultimately, is our legacy?" I believe, in most cases, our legacy is our friends (loves). We write our history onto them, and they walk with us through our days like time capsules, filled with our mutual past, the fragments of our hearts and minds. Our friends get our uncensored questions, and our yet to be reasoned opinions. Our friends (loves) grant us the chance to make our grand, embarrassing, contradictory pronouncements about the world. They get the very best, and are stuck with the absolute worst, we have to offer. Our friends (loves) get our rough drafts. Over time, they both open our eyes and break our hearts..."

Emerson wrote,

'make yourself necessary to someone.' In a chaotic world, friendship (love) is the most elegant, most lasting way to be useful. We are, each of us, a living testament to our friends; compassion and tolerance, humor and wisdom, patience and grit. Friendship, not technology, is the only thing capable of showing us the enormousness of the world."

May God's abundant grace and love bring you wonder and awe, and may the gift of family and friends bring you love and grace in these summer months!

From the Spirit, June 2021

I began my Bishop's Report for the 2021 Synod Assembly on May 15, 2021 by quoting Paul in his letter to the Romans, "I thank my God through Jesus Christ for all of you, because your faith is proclaimed throughout the world."

I am so glad to be the Northwest Washington Synod with you – as we walk, journey, travel together. We are connected as the body of Christ – as siblings in Christ – together. We are the Northwest Washington Synod in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Together in Jesus Christ we are freed by grace to live faithfully, witness boldly, and serve joyfully. As people forgiven and redeemed, beloved and welcomed, we are called to embody God's grace in speech, action, and relationships. I am reminded daily that it is Jesus Christ who loves, welcomes, and forgives. As baptized children of God, we are called to participate in this love, hospitality, and forgiveness. I am thankful for all of you for your love, your welcome, and your forgiveness.

We on the synod staff have agreed to embrace the following statement as we work together with the congregations and ministry sites of this synod: "Trusting in the Spirit, we are journeying together with God's people so that all may discover and participate in what God is doing among us through Jesus."

Further, there are five focus areas interwoven in the work that we are doing as we journey together in Christ:

- 1. Faithful Innovation
- 2. Youth and Young Adults
- 3. Leadership
- 4. Connection
- 5. Racial Justice

I'd like to lift up a few of the actions from the 2021 NW WA Synod Assembly:

- We had our first online assembly with 332 voting members in attendance on Zoom and over 200 following along on our Facebook Livestream.
- We approved the Recommended Changes to the Constitution that were forwarded from the 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly.
- We approved the changes to the Constitution proposed by the Synod Council (with a minor amendment to have the Nominating Committee changed to 5 persons).
- We elected persons to the following: Synod Council Committee on Discipline Consultation Committee Voting Members to the 2022 ELCA Churchwide Assembly
- Approved budget.
- We shared videos from our ministry partners and synod committees/teams.
- Announced Grace Grants recipients.

As we do the work of this synod, I am reminded that it is not us but the Spirit that leads and guides. Trusting God's promises and participating in the Holy Spirit, we have reached places beyond what I thought possible. We have exceeded priorities and we are moving forward towards God's preferred future. I am grateful to be on this journey with you.

Greater Northwest Area clergy and lay members of Alaska, Oregon-Idaho and Pacific Northwest Conferences,

Let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith...

After deep reflection, conversation with my family and consultation with trusted colleagues, I am withdrawing my request for retirement, effective January 2022, to continue my assignment to the Greater Northwest Area. I hope and pray that postponing retirement will relieve anxiety and contribute to an orderly transition of leadership for all the conferences in the Western Jurisdiction during this extended pandemic interruption of normalcy. I am not naming a new retirement date at this time but hope that it might follow in-person general and jurisdictional conferences in 2022, with the election and assignments of new bishops, for a new quadrennium, beginning January 1, 2023.

I never intended my retirement to add to the uncertainty of this wilderness passage. I originally named January 1, 2022 as my retirement date so that my retirement would coincide with that of Bishop Hoshibata and possibly, Bishop Hagiya. At the time, we anticipated regular in-person general and jurisdictional conferences in the fall of 2021, when new bishops might be elected to begin serving as the new quadrennium began with the new year.

Since that request, general and jurisdictional conferences have been put off again, further postponing election and assignment of new bishops. In light of these delays, the timing of my requested retirement is no longer helpful.

I have a renewed sense of focused mission for this extension of my active service and look forward to continuing to work with lay and clergy leadership of the Alaska, Oregon-Idaho and Pacific Northwest Conferences.

Jesus is nudging and tugging the church to engage people and communities with the faith, hope and love of Jesus Christ in ways that bind up wounds, transform lives and overturn systems of exclusion and inequity. We can't stop now.

I'm still running the race with Jesus. Won't you pull up your socks, tie your shoelaces, strengthen your weak knees, and join me for the next leg of the race?

God Sees Me

You see, at just the right time, when we were still powerless, Christ died for the ungodly. Very rarely will anyone die for a righteous person, though



for a good person someone might possibly dare to die. But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us." Romans 5:6-8

Each of us have different roles we play: mother, daughter, worker, friend. We act a certain way, wanting to be seen as competent, successful, pulled together in all ways. But, to be honest, sometimes it's just an act. We hide our imperfections, afraid to let others see the real us. Sometimes, we even try to hide from God. Instead of coming to Him on bended need, acknowledging our sin and weakness, we stay away. We want to "handle" it ourselves. The thing is, we aren't fooling anyone. God see us and it's ok.

God doesn't need us to be "perfect". He KNOWS we're not. God doesn't condemn us because we fall short. God sees us where we're at: the tired parent who has been worn down by, "mom, Mom, MOM!". God sees our struggle to care for aging parents, honoring their presence but fearing their loss. God sees us as we're pulled into so many directions, working, volunteering, caring for friends, family and community. God sees our desire to serve even though we frequently fall short and that's ok. We cannot hide our true selves and we don't need to.

God sees our hearts. God sees our intentions. God sees our failures and loves us anyway. God sees us with all our imperfections and doesn't turn away. We get caught up in our lives, worrying about what other people think of us. We're caught up in ourselves whether it be for an inflated ego or negative self-esteem. BUT it doesn't matter how others see us or how we see ourselves, it matters how GOD sees us. We're blessed with the ultimate gift: He not only sees us, He accepts us. All we need to do is say, "Thank you!"


