

Greetings in Christ!

We are now eighteen full months, a year and a half, into this new reality of living in a COVID world in the year of our Lord 2021. We continue experiencing life in new and unprecedented ways like no other time in our living memories or our world history. We are living in a world that that is in constant flux as the sands continue to shift underneath our feet. We are in a moment, a new time to perhaps consider so much about our past, present and future.

This moment is now, and the future of the church is wide open. Can we imagine and enter into God's dream for us?

I, like many of the voices I have heard, am wondering what the Fall and Winter seasons will have in store for us in Western Washington and our world, in this growing new reality. Autumn is, above all else, even in the normal of yesterday's world, a time of change. It is also a time of new beginnings. In addition to the changing weather as the hours of daylight shorten, we often curtail or eliminate our evening outdoor activities. It is not as dramatic for us here in the Pacific Northwest, yet we still experience the changes in nature from our un-watered brownish lawns turning plush green again with the fall rains, to the changing leaves giving us glimpses of the brilliant colors of autumn. Our lifestyles often change as well; typically, autumn means back to the routine, back to work, back to school, and beginning our planning for fall church and family events. While much of this is still true, whether completely or in part, what will most certainly be true in this time will be the new and changing ways of experiencing fall with adjusted and new routines, experiences, and patterns of life.

As fall begins, our calling is the same as it has been in the past: to experience and hear God's voice, to practice the presence of God, to become closer to God and to follow God on God's mission to bless and heal our world. God has not stopped speaking and calling us even if we are limited in our gatherings and the movements in our lives.

Is it possible for us to remember and imagine that God is with us, for us, and has given us all that we need and the vision to move forward, calling and guiding us as two congregations under one umbrella, and faithfully remembering that God is real and present as we work to not speak, but to be still and quiet to listen and hear God's voice for us.

We will continue to worship online until such a time as the Re-Opening Committee and the Church leadership from both congregations feel it is safe to do so and we have the equipment and person resources in place to gather safely together as we are so desperately longing to do.

We need to remember that this online experience is real worship, and we are still a worshiping community of the Body of Christ in Monroe and beyond. Our worship team continues to creatively design, record and publish our services each week. I would like to take this opportunity to thank them for their faithful, creative, and hard work in this new and ever-changing landscape. Thank you, Kathi, Missy, Cindy, Jill, Nancy and Bryce for your persistence as we learn new skills and as partners in the Gospel, the living Word of God's love and grace.

I appreciate with thanks and gratefulness the leadership of both congregations as we are challenged to rethink with new imaginations and listen to God's imagination for us. We continue to gather as one, united by the grace and the love of God, Jesus the Christ and the Holy Spirit.

We need to remember that wearing masks, social distancing, and getting vaccinated are real and authentic acts of love for one another and our world. John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement calls us to consider Three Simple Rules. He said, "If you want to follow Jesus—if you want to love God and love your neighbor—then live by these three simple rules: **Do no harm, Do good, Stay in love with God.**"

May you continue to seek, find, and receive God's hope, love and grace this autumn in surprising and unexpected ways.

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May you *imagine* and trust the promise that we are who God tells us we are, beloved, and then to simply live that out in our lives wherever we are, and with whomever crosses our paths as the image of God's grace, love and presence intersecting their lives.

<u>See you in church!</u> Remember that church has not been cancelled and that while we worship online, we are still the Body of Christ worshiping and living out our calling as disciples of Christ in and for our world.

From the Bishop:

At first glance, it does not seem as though Teresa of Avila, noted Spanish Roman Catholic saint from the sixteenth century, would have much to say about today's world. You see, she is well known for her mysticism,

her ecstatic prayers, several quotes that she might or might not have said, and her reforms in the church. All of these things are interesting – but what do they have to do with the 21st century and what is happening in the world today? In the last few days, though, I have been thinking about what she writes at the beginning of her work, *The Interior Castle*.

At the beginning of this book Teresa admits that she is tired. On the first page she writes, "I'm writing this book under obedience and I'm already finding it hard. God hasn't given me any desire for this work, and my head is so full of noise I can barely compose a letter about the most ordinary business, much less a book about prayer."

I am so thankful for Teresa stating it bluntly. Teresa is unsure if she'll succeed, she is not sure she has it in her to do what she is being asked to do, she is nervous and distracted. In other words, St. Teresa sounds a lot like all of us — especially when we are being asked to do something that is different or hard or difficult.

Truthfully, it can be daunting as we continue to navigate this pandemic, as we continue to navigate the changes of the world and the changing church, as we strive to live into what God is calling us to do. It is difficult, as Teresa fully expresses, to push past our fear or our unease or our malaise to do what God is calling us to do. It is pretty impossible to do a new thing without God's help and guidance.

And so, as I reflect on Teresa's difficulties, our difficulties, I am also drawn to scripture – specifically Isaiah 43. In the first part of Isaiah 43 we read:

But now thus says the Lord, he who created you, O Jacob,

he who formed you, O Israel:

Do not fear, for I have redeemed you;

I have called you by name, you are mine.

When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned,

and the flame shall not consume you.

For I am the Lord your God,

the Holy One of Israel, your Savior.

The prophet writes that God created us, God formed us. We have no need for fear because God knows each of our names. God calls each of us. We are God's. No matter the circumstance, no matter the trial, no matter the fire. This is what Teresa understood and it is what we cling to when we struggle and when we wonder if we can go on. I invite you to hold Isaiah 43:1-3 closely as we hear these words from Isaiah 43:18-19.

Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old.

I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert.

As we hold close the promise that God creates us, forms us, names us, calls us, and holds us, only then can we hear the promise in these words that a new thing, a new day is coming. That God will make a way. May we hold close the words of St. Teresa and the prophet Isaiah. May you feel God's love surrounding you when all seems overwhelming. And may you rise in the strength of the Lord knowing that God's love surrounds you and fills you – and a way is being made as we all go forward together in Christ.

OCTOBER GUEST PREACHER

The sermon on October 3 is offered by Pastor Andy Yee. Pastor Yee comes to us from the NWWA ELCA Synod as a means of support for congregations in the Pacific Northwest



I'm not a theologian and don't claim to be one, but I am a believer in God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. I believe in God's Word, that it contains eternal truths made evident by the Spirit and that we can draw closer to Him through the teachings His Word contains. I heard God speaking recently during a sermon by Retired Licensed Local Pastor Peggy Ray (otherwise known as my mother)

During her sermon she said this, "To be a disciple of Jesus is to follow where he leads. John Wesley distinguished between "bearing a cross" and "taking up a cross." We "bear a cross" when suffering is laid on us that we did not choose. Keeping our faith under those circumstances is a significant challenge. But Jesus really is asking for more. He is asking that rather than focus on our suffering, on ourselves, we continue to focus our attention on doing his work. Taking up the cross is accepting the call to act with God's love in the world, whatever the cost."

I've led a challenging life – worse than some and better than others. I've frequently thought of the unfairness that "bearing" a cross brings. I get angry at God for making me bear what I've had to bear. It is, as she said, a challenge to keep my faith during these times and I show my immaturity in my faith when I focus on MY suffering instead of the sacrifice God made for me. When I stop feeling sorry for myself and realize the gift I've actually been given through the cross, I am shocked into awareness of the reality of my life. Yes, I've been betrayed by friends but no one has sold my trust. Yes, I've gone through pain in my life but I've never been nailed to a cross. And I've never CHOSEN to put myself through these most painful of circumstances all for others.

Jesus calls us to "take up" our cross. I like the action verb. It's not passive. It's not "enduring" suffering. It's CHOOSING suffering for God's sake. It's focusing on the "other" rather than the "self". I find these words comforting because it takes all my pain and uses it. Our suffering isn't for nothing. Whatever we're going through, whatever we're struggling with, God is taking all of that and using it for good. I am accepting the call to be there for others. I'm accepting the call to spread the Good News. I'm "accepting the call to act with God's love in the world, whatever the cost."

REOPENING COMMITTEE UPDATE

The Reopening Committee completed its work and presented it to the MSLC and MUMC Church Councils in June. At that time, the Church Councils realized that reopening would take many more volunteers than usual. Since many congregation members as well as key members of the worship committee were on summer vacations, it didn't seem feasible. The hope was that we could reopen in September. However, the transmissibility of Covid has increased rather than decreased since then. The Delta variant and the high percentage of unvaccinated residents in Snohomish County increases the risk of transmission. So the situation is far riskier now than it was in June.






