**May is upon us;** the days are getting longer and warmer and spring has sprung. Many if not all plants are beginning to grow shoots and put on buds and some are even blooming like crazy as I see out my front window.

In the church year we are now in a new season, Easter Sunday is over...now what? Well, for Christians who are part of the Church that adheres to the church/liturgical calendar, as we at United in Grace are as Methodists and Lutherans united have just entered Eastertide. Also referred to as Easter Season, or Paschal Tide, Eastertide is the season of the church that begins with Easter Sunday and ends with the Feast of Pentecost. There are a total 50 days to this season during which we celebrate the Risen Lord. This year Pentecost Sunday is on June 8<sup>th</sup> with Holy Trinity Sunday the following week on June 15<sup>th</sup>.

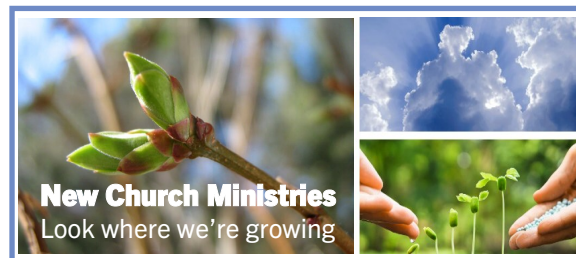

## **CONGREGATIONAL MEETING ON MAY 4 AFTER WORSHIP IN THE SANCTUARY**

Church expenses typically exceed giving by roughly \$5-7,000 per month. The church council is preparing a budget to close that gap. To help pay current expenses and support that budget, the church council recommends that all restrictions and designations on the church's Cash Reserve Fund, Pastoral Housing Fund, and Permanent Endowment Fund be removed and those funds be rolled into the General Fund. A congregational meeting will be held to approve this action. All members of the congregations before the formation of UIG and all who have requested membership since the merger, who have attended worship services in person or online and have made a financial contribution to this congregation in this or the previous calendar year, may vote at this meeting.



### ***United in Grace's New Elder Care Ministry***

We are excited to announce that the Church Council has approved the creation of an Elder Care Ministry. The ministry has two important purposes. The first is to provide opportunities for elderly members of the Congregation to remain fully engaged in church activities. The second purpose is to provide assistance to church elders through services provided by church volunteers and by connecting those with specific needs with services offered by other organizations. The Elder Care Ministry will work in collaboration with our church's other care ministries, all which fall under the umbrella of the Congregation Life Committee.

To develop a well thought out ministry, our first step will be to ask senior members of our church to share their ideas. In the coming days, you will hear from one of the two coordinators of the Elder Care Ministry or from Rhonda Morgan or Nancy Franke, both who have kindly offered to seek input from church seniors. We also welcome ideas from younger members of the congregation.

We have started looking into the current resources and programs available to seniors living in our geographical area. Please share any relevant information with us. And, we welcome your assistance with our research.

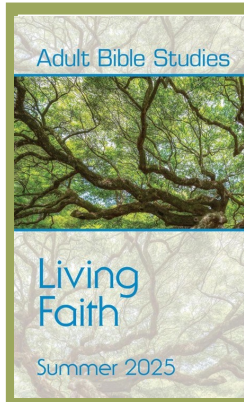
### ***Children's Ministry***

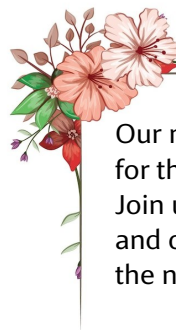

**May is Mental Health Awareness Month.** It is during this month that we raise awareness of the stigma and struggle of those dealing with mental health difficulties. It is a time of self-reflection as we look mental illness squarely in the face and tell ourselves and those around us that this is not something to be ashamed of. It is not caused by sin in our lives. Every person with a mental illness is not in a facility or on the streets. We are your mothers and fathers, your spouse, your children and your friends. We are warriors.



I started my mental health journey when I was a child. I first attempted suicide when I was 12. At 14 I was diagnosed with bipolar. In my 20's my diagnosis changed to schizoaffective disorder – a combination of both a mood disorder and schizophrenia. I didn't just have bad years, I had bad decades. Times when I couldn't get out of bed or spent money we couldn't afford. Times I did spend in facilities, grateful my spouse understood and was willing to care for me when I couldn't work. Times I would sit and scream because I thought I was literally in hell being tormented by Satan, hallucinating demon bugs crawling over my scalp or voices I thought were real telling me things from nightmares.

But there were good times as well. I was able to find a medication cocktail that rescued me from the hallucinations and delusions. I was able to serve God. I made friends that love and support me. And God was always with me, even when his love struggled to reach through the psychosis. Some of you may remember when I would sit in church and cry. I'm not that person anymore but those memories remind me of what so many people go through.

Only a small percentage of those with mental illness have a severe form of it as I have. They may not cry in church, but they may go home right after feeling disconnected from the rest of the body. They may take medications that make them tired or overweight. They may need a friendly smile or hug, something that says, "I love you" or "I'm here for you".

So, this month think about those in our midst who struggle silently. Let us not sit in judgement of those who may be on the streets because they don't have access to the medical care they need. Let those around us feel God's love through us. We are all God's children, and we all struggle in different ways. Understand that while mental illness is serious and impactful, it does not define us. We work, love and play. We parent and serve. We need your love and support. Even when we can't give it back. Love us anyway.

**From the Bishop:**

There is a well-known parable where Jesus talks about seeds thrown in wild abandon. Seeds thrown randomly, haphazardly, you could almost say carelessly ... some seeds tossed upon

a path, some seeds on rocky ground, some seeds among thorns and other seeds on so-called “good soil.” (To read the whole parable, go to Matthew 13:1-9, Mark 4:2-9, Luke 8:4-8.)

In the parable there is extravagance, luxury, lavishness. Truth be told, it is terrible farming. But if you take out what we all know about farming techniques, the throwing of seeds in this parable is unfathomable and incomprehensible and beautiful to behold.

And yet ... so often we want to tame the throwing of seeds. We want to make straight lines and uniform rows. We want organization and structure. We might want new things to grow, but we want them to be what we want. Perhaps newish ... but not new. Undergirding it all, I think we want control over this seed thing.

But this isn't how the Spirit works.

Instead, as we hear in this parable, God's seed-throwing is all about possibility and energy and the extravagance of God. This parable is about the wildness of God's Spirit. The Sower is throwing out seeds with abandon so that something may develop, sprout, and grow – something unexpected, something astonishing.

This, of course, doesn't mean we cast aside everything already growing. Not at all. Nowhere in this parable does it say that the plants already rooted must be cleared before new seeds can be sown. There are deep-rooted plants already flourishing in God's Garden. These plants have lived through trials and joys and still bear fruit. They need to be watered and tended. They deserve our care, our gratitude, our celebration. The new seeds being scattered don't replace what is planted. Instead, they add to the texture and beauty of God's Garden. Old and new. Rooted and scattered. This parable reminds us that God's Garden is not static—it's alive, growing, evolving.

Of course, some seeds that have been thrown have not always taken root. As the parable says – some seeds fall on rocky ground, other seeds land on thorns. There have been experiments that started with high hopes that ended sooner than we would like. There were perhaps disagreements or different ways of doing things. It is true that what works in one section of God's Garden doesn't necessarily work in others.

But this is why we plant and trust and sow and dig in the dirt. This is why we trust this Sower sowing seeds. For God's Garden is founded not on the quality of soil but on the lavishness of God the Sower through the Spirit.

When I hear this parable, I celebrate the many different ways that we are living into and sharing God's love and grace in this synod – in ways that the saints before us would recognize and cherish, and in ways they might never have imagined. I invite you to pause for a moment and think of the place and space where you are promised forgiveness and new life, where you receive the body and blood of Jesus, where you hear the proclamation of grace through faith, where you have holy community. What are some ways that you are deeply rooted? What are some ways that seeds of new possibilities

are being planted? What are seeds that are in the wind right now but haven't landed yet? When you think of the broader community where you live – what is your congregation called to in partnership and imagination? How is the Sower throwing seeds of God's love and grace where you live and move and breathe?

In the Northwest Washington Synod, let us rejoice in this time when old and new things come together. Now is the time that the Spirit is opening us up to new possibilities. Now is the time for listening and collaboration and being in community. Now is the time when we both hold that which we already love and, at the same time, open our hands in order to receive other gifts of promise and wonder.

The dirt, the soil that we are becomes holy ground when God is present. God's seeds of grace fall indiscriminately into the lives of all God's children, into the rocky, thorny, barren and fertile soil of our lives and ministries. The outcome of this gracious sowing cannot be known immediately. One never knows what may come of decadent grace. And yet, day by day, the Sower sows in wild graciousness. And we receive. Together.
